2.3.1 Promotion of Research:	 Seven departments offer Ph.D. Programs. Out of 43 Aided Staff members, 30 teachers have completed their Research Degree. The institution has taken initiatives to collaborate with National Research Organizations. Many Faculty members are involved in Minor & Major Research Projects. 99 students are pursuing M.Phil. and 44 students have registered for Ph.D. 26 Research Scholars have completed their Ph.D. in the College.
2.3.2 Research and Publications Output:	 Has significant faculty involvement in research. 7 Research Projects with a total outlay of Rs.22 lakhs is taken up. DST-FIST Programme is sanctioned to Physics Department with a grant Rs.35lakhs. 58 Research Publications by faculty.

2.4 Infrastructure and Learning Resources:	
2.4.1 Physical Facilities for Learning:	 The College is situated in a sprawling campus in 45.20 acres with a built up area of 3,68,640 sq.ft. 9 different blocks are adequate for meeting

	 all the requirements. The College has 59 class rooms, 21 staff rooms and adequate space for other offices. The College has an exclusive computer centre with 250 terminals, 3 air conditioned seminar, conference and audio/visual hall. The institution provides transport facilities (7 buses & 2 vans) Uninterrupted High Tension Power Supply with 250 KVA is provided to laboratories, class rooms, hostels. Generators with
	 completely automated power supply and generator backup is also provided. Auditorium with a seating capacity of 3000. Limited Wi-Fi facility in the campus.
2.4.2 Maintenance of Infrastructure:	Budget of Rs.40lakhs is provided for maintenance.
2.4.3 Library as a Learning Resources	 Library has a collection of 41217 books and 74 magazines and journals and good number of e-resources. Library Resources are augmented every year with new editions and titles. Efforts are being made to computerize the Library.
2.4.4 ICT as Learning Resources:	 Adequate computer facilities with 336 computers in the College which are distributed across departments and computer labs. The Internet Lab houses 40 computers and the computer lab houses 250 computers. Internet facility with broad band and Wi-Fi accessing is extended to the faculty and students. College has 9 LCDS.
2.4.5 Other Facilities:	 The institution has adequate staff rooms, rest rooms, hostels with access to transport, library, internet and telephone facilities. There are 3 hostels having a total of 389 rooms and accommodating 1900 students. The institution has facility for outdoor and indoor games, including gymnasium. Good kitchen and dining facilities in women's Hostels RO treated water plant for safe drinking water.
2.4.6 Best Practices in the development of Infrastructure and Learning Resources (If any):	 Adequate infrastructure and hostel facilities for large number of students Computer Lab and adequate number of computers. Language Lab is available. Initiatives like setting up waste water recycling unit, vermi compost unit, Gobar Gas Plant & ATM.

2.5 Student Support and Progression:	
2.5.1 Student Progression:	 The institution has a good progression rate of 80% from UG courses to PG courses. It has a progression rate of 30% from PG to Research. The dropout rate is quite low.
2.5.2 Student Support:	 Every year the College publishes the updated prospectus, academic calendar and College Magazine. The Placement cell collects information about employment opportunities. The information of the students are collected in a centralized way for preparing a placement broucher and the same is utilized for placement activities. Students are given guidance and counseling for facing the competitive examinations. The Placement Cell has been active and helping students. 125 placements reported. Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual Harassment Cell and Research & Development Committees are in place.
2.5.3 Student Activities:	 The institution provides access to general activities as well as co-curricular activities. The students also participate in numerous sports activities conducted in various institutions and forums and have won many accolades.
2.5.4 Best Practices in Student Support and Progression (If any):	 Students are encouraged to participate in the seminars, workshops, conferences and cultural contest organized by other institutions. The College has organized Career Guidance and Counseling to the final year students. Employment opportunities for nearly 800 students under "Earn while your learn scheme". Students have excelled in many sports activities. Computer literacy programme is provided by the College to increase employability. Hostel accommodation to nearly 80% of the students.

2.6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership:	 Faculty members are actively involved in the decision making process of the institution. The Management follows participatory style of administration giving functional freedom to the Principal in the academic decision making.
2.6.2 Organizational Arrangements:	The institution is managed by statutory bodies which meet regularly to oversee the functioning of the institution.

2.6.3 Strategy Development and Deployment:	 Administration is decentralized. Several Committees are formed at the College level for helping in the effective administration of the College.
