15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The college is preparing a design thinking curriculum as envisaged by NEP 2020, starting from December 2022. The Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) is establishing modalities to create customised study paths for efficient and effective learning outcomes. Through various programmes, all the teachers have been constructively sensitised about the implementation of NEP 2020 curricular aspects. College integrates the disciplines of arts and science by offering additional, value-added, and interdisciplinary courses. It also allows students choice of courses based on their personal preferences. Since 2004, the College has been implementing the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). Autonomy and CBCS both provide students with horizontal mobility and equip graduates for a lifetime of learning. Value Education is a compulsory course for all UG students. Environmental Studies course is offered to all UG students. Further, the community engagement activities, incorporated into the curriculum. The Curriculum Development Cell plans to develop a flexible curriculum that has multiple entry and exits. The College has developed a road map for maximizing and effectively utilizing the knowledge and resources of adjacent institutions and universities. The Institution had adopted multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to learning well in advance, through nonmajor elective course and Inter-departmental elective courses, providing open choice to the learners.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College is registered with Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) through the National Academic Depository (NAD) in accordance with the UGC's recommendation. A total of 1800 students have registered with ABC.

17.Skill development:

Our college offers academic programs with contemporary relevance and job connectivity, as well as in-built modules for character and skill development. Skill Enhancement and Employability Development (SEED) Training Programme empowers the students with various skills, based on their career choices (Higher Education, Entrepreneurship or Placement). Value Education is a compulsory course for all Under Graduate students. Value Education — an ability enhancement compulsory course is offered in the second semester for all Under Graduate students. Value Education course has been enriched with Universal Human Values, Human Rights, Constitutional Rights, Ethics and Morals. 56 Value-added Courses offered by different departments provide opportunities for students to identify their fields of interest and enhance their skills pertinent to them. The College is also conducting skill training courses for the community through PMKVY scheme under NSDC, GoI.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The Institution adopted Outcome Based Education (OBE) with Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) Curriculum Framework since 2019. Outcome Based Education with Choice-Based Credit System Curriculum Framework has been designed for all Under Graduate, Post Graduate, five years integrated and Vocational programmes. This is to emphasise more upon the learning outcomes of the courses, focusing on higher order learning/skills of Analysing, Evaluating and Creating. Programme Educational Objectives (PEOs) are framed based on the Vision and Mission of the Institution. With PEOs as the guiding objectives, pertinent Programme Outcomes (POs) and Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are formulated for every Under Graduate and Post Graduate Programme. Fundamental, Applied and Advance Courses are identified and incorporated into the Curriculum Framework. The modules are designed, incorporating traditional as well as contemporary concepts, theories, applications and essential skills components. Quality Assurance in Teaching-Learning Process is done through Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA), System Audit and Total Quality Management (TQM). Student-centric learning methods for each of the courses, enabling effective attainment of the COs are given as recommendation. The course handling faculty members are encouraged to adopt appropriate student-centric blends of pedagogy, andragogy and heutagogy methodologies in the teaching-learning

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process.

Nehru Memorial College, Puthanampatti, is a 56years old College, situated in a remote rural hamlet which provides quality education to the students of socially and economically weaker sections of the society. Significantly above 80% of the students happen to be the first generation learners. The autonomy conferred to ourcollege right from 2004 was taken in the right perspective and it propelled us to invoke innovative approaches in designing thecurriculum by taking into account the socio-economic background of the local community and the scientific technological advancementshappening around the world. Even before the autonomy was conferredupon the institution, the college had taken a very challenginginitiative to introduce Computer Science in undergraduate programmes in 1983 as the pioneering Arts and Science College inthe state which revolutionized the employability of thousands of poor students hailing from the rural villages. The college hasalso started offering M.Sc., in Instrumentation as early as in 1983, M.Sc. Embedded systems since 2013 and MScData Science from 2017 and BSc Data Science in 2019. So the college is one of theremarkable institutions in India to innovate and introducerelevant local, national and global need-based curriculum for more than three decades.

It also createsawareness among the students about energy conservation, useof solar power etc., in their day to day life. The course on Genderstudies inculcates in the young minds on gender equity, dignity, and the respect and recognition to be given to the women. Thecourse on Soft skills helps the students to enhance theirinterpersonal relationship with others and in the decisionmakingprocess in real life. Substantial importance is given in thecurriculum to impart business and professional ethics amongthestudents through courses such as Entrepreneurial Development, Stress Management, Business Environment, RetailMarketing, Agricultural Marketing, Business Law, Company Law, Capital Market, etc., of the programme concerned. The curriculumis designed insuch a way that the student learns not only the subject concerned but also learns necessary life skills.

3.3.1 - Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and creation and transfer of knowledge supported by dedicated centres for research, entrepreneurship, community orientation, incubation, etc.

Lab to Land Program: The college has identified the necessity of translating theideasgenerated from the lab to the actual place where thepublic can use the technology for improving their livelihood. The Post Graduateand Research Department of Zoology establisheda Vermicompost Production Unit in the campus. The students and public are trained in the production process and also started creating awareness among the public. The bio waste from the hostel kitchens are used togenerate 20m3of gobar gas. Thus generated biogas is used as fuel for cooking in the women's hostel. Over 3000 resident students and staff usewater (~50000 litres/day) for different purposes like drinking, washing and bathing. The used water or wastewater from hostels is treated and then utilized to irrigate 40 acres of citrus fruit or chard. This method has created a culture of wastewater utilization to irrigate farms and increase the income of agriculturalists in the nearby villages.

At present there are seven blocks which include the MainBlock, Muthiah Block, Swami Vivekananda Block, Er Sujatha Block,

Dr Radhakrishanan Block, Chellammal Block and Hotel ManagementandCatering Science Block. In these seven blocks there are ninety ventilated and comfortable class rooms with adequate furniture andother facilities for reading and learning. Among these classrooms, 40 rooms are provided with ICT facilities for effectivelearning. There are 10 laboratories with state-oftheartequipment/instruments for physical science programmes and4computer laboratories with 600 computers and LED Projectors. Inaddition to this, there are well equipped DST/FistSponsoredLaboratories for Research and Development. The studentsare divided into batches. Time table is prepared insuch a way toaccommodate all the students in batches to utilize thelaboratories. There are fivefully air conditioned Seminar Hallsequipped withLCDProjectors, Smartboards, whiteboards with internetconnectivityand a state-of-the-art sound system to supplement the Teaching Learning process. There is a huge Multipurpose Hall(Auditorium) with a seatingcapacity of 2000 students for conducting ultural programmes andother students related functions such as College dayCelebrations, Students' Union Council, Literary AssociationActivities etc. Further, a separate research block isavailable for research advisor and research scholars. Central instrumentation facility is available in the research block.

TEACHING LEARNING PROCESS Based on the percentage of marksobtained by students the resultwas analyzed to judge their performance in attaining each course outcome. All deviations were closely studied by the IQAC which came up with an action plan to close short falls and improve the efficiency of the teaching learning process. As part of the follow up the IQAC has made two recommendations to strengthen the

teaching, learning process.

Keeping in view of the scientifically proven importance of graphics and visuals incommunication, the IQAC recommended greater use of ICT tools incourse delivery. As a result there is a 70% improvement inperformance in memory based tests and 30% saving in required learning time. The time thus gained is utilized inintensive study and practice of conceptual topics. This was a hugedeparture from and advantage over the conventional text bookcumchalk-and-talk method. Further, the IQAC suggested that the discussion and case study methods should be preferred to the stand-alone mode. This interactive communication helps teachers actively identify the short comings and also initiate on-the spotremedial action.
